CLASSIC COCKTAILS

PISCO PUNCH

Invented by Duncan Nicol at a bar named Bank Exchange at the end of the 19th century, in San Francisco, California. The Bank Exchange was located in south-east corner of the intersection of the Montgomery and Washington streets, in the Montgomery Block building, where the Transamerica Pyramid now stands.

The first alleged use of the specific name "Old Fashioned" was for a Bourbon whiskey cocktail in the 1880s, at the Pendennis Club, a gentlemen's club in Louisville, Kentucky. The "Old Fashioned" was the favorite cocktail of Presidents Franklin D. Roosevelt and Harry S Truman and his wife Bess.
